I saw quite a lot of this Unit as I was transferred there on Anzac Day 1941 From the British 26 th General Hospital after being wounded at Lempe with the 2/2<sup>nd</sup> Australian Infantry Battalion.

It was heaven compared with the treatment by the regulars of the 26 th Gen. even though Jerry came in a couple of days later.

I got to know quite a few of the gang who stayed behind to look after the wounded.

Tho a lot of names escape me, I have happy memories of a very special Unit – Names that spring to mind are Albert Pettit, he had a mate whose name I forget, maybe Charlie? This pair made a wonderful duo, gentle as my own Mother in the care of patients.

There was a young lad too, Stan Bobridge and a Peter Leach.

My own doctor was Captain David Leake, a wonderful man —

Also met Maj Brooke Moore, a terrific bloke, and in Germany, tho I didn't meet him was Captain Norman Rose, who was a legend in his own lifetime.

I could tell a tale or two of his exploits even tho as I say I didn't meet him, when Rosie spoke even the Jerries jumped.
